

LAW SCHOOL FOR WOMEN.

DR. EMILY KEMPIN WILL START A COLLEGE FOR GIRLS.

Dr. Emily Kempin, graduate of the University of Zurich, Switzerland, who proposes to start a law school for women in this city on Tuesday next, outlined the plan of her institution before some two dozen ladies and gentlemen at her home, 128 East Fifty-ninth-street, last evening. The doctor is a pleasant-faced little woman, who speaks with great emphasis and a foreign accent. She began by saying that the men lawyers of New-York were not very smart after all, because a number of them told her distinctly that woman would not be allowed to practice in this State, and when she herself looked the question up, with little trouble, she found that women can gain admission to the New-York bar under an amendment of the Civil Code dated May 19, 1886.

She went on to say that she did not intend to turn out pupils fitted simply to earn their bread and butter, but fitted to cope with any legal light of the day in any court. She will begin from the beginning and teach the old Roman and Germanic law, and her pupils will not be as dependent on text books as their brothers are.

The doctor announced that the course would be two years, with a supplementary year in a law office, and that the pupils would be examined for the bar by the Supreme Court Judges, as her college has not as yet a charter.

Fourteen young ladies from all over the country will begin work at the school, which will be held in the doctor's residence on Tuesday.

Dr. Kempin read letters of sympathy from ex-Judge Noah Davis, Charles D. Kellogg, William Allen Butler, and Rev. Dr. Howard Crosby, and announced that the following ladies and gentlemen would probably accept places on the Visiting, Administration, and Instruction Committees: Everett P.
